### TEACHER TO PREACHER

Ever since Henry & Marilyn met as college students many years ago, they have embarked on a life of mentoring the next generation, serving in Christian schools across Canada for 23 years.

In the late 90s, the Vandermeers decided to pursue ministry. They became Village Missionaries and served Nukko Lake, BC, for eleven years. In 2011, they stepped into the District Representatives role.



Each of the skills they have acquired over three decades of education and ministry, the Vandermeers have brought into their ministry of training our missionaries and strengthening our churches.

Twice a year, they visit each field for at least two days. Although their time together is short, what happens during that time is vitally important to both our missionaries and churches.





### **MENTORSHIP**

A crucial component of Henry & Marilyn's ministry is mentorship: investing in the lives of our missionaries and their families.

By taking the time to truly know our missionaries, the Vandermeers are better equipped to help them navigate the trials of rural ministry.

In fact, Henry & Marilyn set aside at least one full day for fellowship with the missionaries and their families. The Vandermeers have found that the real heart-to-heart

moments happen when everyone is most comfortable and enjoying each other's company.

Village Missionary Chris White, currently serving in Rich Valley, Alberta, personally understands how important a deepened relationship with your District Representative can be.

"I would not be here today if it wasn't for Henry's faithful ministry in my life. I thank God continually for Henry and all that he has done for me and my family."





### LEADERSHIP DEVELOPEMENT

Henry & Marilyn also care about strengthening the leadership of the churches. This is where their people skills and experience in education really blossom.

"Most of the challenges that a DR faces are not theological," Henry reveals. "They are practical human challenges—how we deal with conflict and with each other."

Usually the first day of the Vandermeer's bi-yearly visit focuses on meeting with the board members, assessing problems that threaten the health and unity of the church, and how they can best resolve them in a Biblical way.

Afterwards, Henry conducts a teaching workshop for both board and church members. Because of their remote locations and often lack of available finances, most of our churches would not normally be able to have learning opportunities like these.

After much prayer, our National Board of Directors has agreed to add another District Representative alongside Henry & Marilyn, who currently oversee all the churches in Canada. This couple will be Village Missionaries Gordon & Valerie Rowland, who have served with us for 40 years.



By adding another DR, the number of fields each couple oversee will decrease. This means they will have more time to adequately disciple, mentor, and equip our missionaries and churches.
