DAN AND CYNTHIA REAGAN STONYFORD COMMUNITY CHURCH STONYFORD, CA

Village Missionaries Dan and Cynthia Reagan arrived in Stonyford, California, with their children in August 2019. At that point, Stonyford Community Church was struggling and had few children. Together, Dan and the church board formulated a new purpose statement: Stonyford Community Church (SCC) exists to glorify God and make disciples.

Only months later, the Covid pandemic began. Like churches around the country, SCC suspended all activities and began meeting online. How could they achieve their purpose without meeting in person?



But God had plans for SCC. The weekly Bible study grew from 5 to 15 participants as they met on the parsonage lawn. Restrictions did allow a church service outside, and they met all summer under a 6x6 cattle shade. Dan and his children led the singing. People passing by noticed, and soon new families with children began to attend.

Anticipating that pandemic restrictions could continue into the autumn, Dan and the leaders started discussing options for cool, rainy days. A portable rodeo tent? Too expensive. A large carport? Too small to be helpful. Finally, they had the idea of erecting a pavilion. This would provide shelter for outdoor services for the duration of the pandemic and an open-air shelter for community activities.



In October, they broke ground for the pavilion. By Thanksgiving, it was nearly finished. With some portable propane heaters, the people of SCC could meet comfortably in this structure through the California winter.

"In this pandemic! God moved us out of our four walls and forced us to meet in a different way to reach people beyond those walls," Dan said. "A concrete floor and a metal roof gave us a gathering place open to the community. We can worship the Lord and proclaim the good news of Jesus – we found that this is all we needed. Our small church quickly doubled in size."

They are achieving their purpose of glorifying God and making disciples.



TERRY & JANE BASKIN GRINDROD GOSPEL CHURCH GRINDROD. BC

On Christmas Eve 2020, Village Missionary Terry Baskin preached from a make-shift platform outside Grindrod Gospel Church in British Columbia, Canada. Musicians stood inside and played their instruments in front of the windows, amplified by speakers. The whole village heard the carols.

The winter weather prevented further drive-in services, but Terry began using an FM radio transmitter in the spring. In March, the people of Grindrod Gospel Church parked around the church and listened to the service on their car radios, happy to see each other as they worshiped.




Psalm 68:19 was especially meaningful to Terry during the pandemic: "Blessed be the Lord, who daily loads us with benefits—the God of our salvation" (NKJV).

Terry said, "In the moments when I felt overcome with the challenges facing us and all the privileges we had lost as a church, I thought of this verse and remembered how much God gives us each day. God also reminded me that any restrictions do not bind his Word and that He is still building His church through our Lord Jesus."

DENNIS & LESLIE BURKE FAMILY BIBLE CHURCH AMSTERDAM. NY

One cold, windy Sunday in early spring 2020, cars pulled into the parking lot of Family Bible Church outside Amsterdam, New York and formed a semi-circle. Their Village Missionary, Dennis Burke, preached from a podium on the church's porch. At one point, the wind blew over the podium and carried the worship leader's music away, but the people continued worshipping.

Over the following months, about 30 people came each Sunday for these parking lot services. One time the worship leader walked from car to car with a cordless mike, inviting people to give a testimony to the Lord's work. Instead of loud amens, the congregation responded to each speaker by honking their car horns.

"It was spontaneous and beautiful," Dennis said.

Many churches in the area completely shut down, so

people from those churches came to FBC services. One day the neighbors across the street set up lawn chairs and listened. People who didn't come to church sometimes stopped by to talk. Two weeks ago, a 12-yr-old girl stood and told everyone that the church had helped her family come back together and how happy she is to be coming to church.

"The Lord grew our church during the pandemic. We had to do things differently, but the Lord blessed whatever we were doing."





ALAN & BONNIE KLEIN FREEDOM BIBLE CHURCH SUTHERLAND'S RIVER, NS

Freedom Bible Church is a church of about 35 people in Sutherland's River in Nova Scotia, Canada. Village Missionaries Alan and Bonnie Klein have served there for 15 years.

In 2019 God brought Joel Mantel, a videographer, and his family to the church. Alan and Joel occasionally discussed livestreaming the church service. Little did they know it would soon be necessary!

When the Covid pandemic began, Nova Scotia shut things down quickly. The Kleins tried to livestream their service, but their Internet was too slow. Then Alan turned to Joel. Each week Alan recorded the service onto a memory card. Joel, or his wife Angela, edited the video and uploaded it to the church's Facebook page.

For several years, Alan had been working to improve their church's Facebook page and make it more effective. During Covid, 1,200 people saw the recording of their 2020 Easter service! Each week Alan was surprised by some who watched their service. "People who don't go to church were watching our service," he said.

Anne is one example. She knew of Freedom Bible Church from a friend but hadn't attended. With online services, Anne began tuning in. She contacted the Kleins and visited with them in their backyard. Sitting under their apple tree, Anne told them about her struggles and said she wanted to make some changes. They told her about the hope and healing found in Jesus. Anne accepted the Lord that day.

Village missionaries and the churches they serve were beacons of life and hope during the dark days of the pandemic. They faithfully and creatively ministered, and God was pleased to use them for His purposes. Let us join the Psalmist in proclaiming "You make me glad by your deeds, O LORD; I sing for joy at the works of your hands" (Psalm 92:4).
