A THREAT BECOMES A PROMISE

"If you don't behave, I'll send you to Horsefly, B.C." That's the joke their former DR sometimes made to Gary and Patsy Semenyna when he visited them in Wasa, B.C. Horsefly is one of the beautiful but remote communities where Village Missions has a partner church.

In 2021, Gary and Patsy did go to Horsefly—as new District Representatives!

The Semenynas stepped into the DR role in May, following a 7-year leave of absence from VM. Their district is unusual: it includes fields in the western provinces of British Columbia and Alberta and the

eastern provinces of Nova Scotia and Ontario. 6,000 kilometers separate the farthest eastern point from the farthest western point. Visiting missionary families on fields so far apart requires energy and commitment. Supporting and encouraging them



through an ongoing pandemic and restrictions is also a challenge.

It's a challenge the Semenynas are willing to tackle. They know the missionaries need a trustworthy confidante as well as insight, ideas and encouragement to carry on. They trust that God will empower and guide them.

Their first task was to meet the missionaries and start building a relationship with them. They only knew 2 of the 13 couples in their district.

As they traveled and interacted with the missionary families, Gary and Patsy were encouraged by their

obvious love for their communities.

"It's good to see how God fits people into the right place for the right time," Patsy said. "We're impressed by the quality and commitment of these missionary pastors and wives."

BACK ON THE ROAD

After several hours of driving through the fields of central Manitoba, Gordon & Val Rowland pulled into the small community of Amaranth. The day was cold and windy, but Village Missionaries Jay & Kaylee Foster and the people of Amaranth Gospel Mission gave the Rowlands a warm welcome and a delicious meal.



Extensive travel is one of the most difficult aspects of the DR role for Gordon and Val Rowland. They were away from home 60 of the 90 days from September through November, and they traveled 13,000 kilometers.

Their district stretches from the foothills of the Rocky Mountains across farming country to the lakes and trees of northern Ontario. The VM fields are diverse, but they have a couple things in common:

 They have people who love the Lord and want to see a Gospel church in their community. Every field has people who need the Lord and people who are hurting.



In the fall, the Rowlands were very happy to get back on the road. They couldn't do field visits in the spring, so they were eager to see the missionary families in their district and interact with people at their churches.

"We arrived in Ear Falls, Ontario, on a Saturday afternoon in late October. In the evening I met with Jonathan Elgby and the two elders of Ear Falls Chapel.

On Sunday morning we worshiped with the congregation, shared an update from Village Missions and listened to Jonathan preach the Word of God. It is always good to see the missionaries in action and observe how they are ministering to their community.

When the Elgbys asked us to stay an extra day, we readily agreed. Monday afternoon we walked along the beach of a nearby lake as the kids played. Back at the parsonage, we built a bonfire and cooked supper over it. We find it is during these informal times that the Village Missionaries relax and open up about challenges and discouragements.

Visiting Jonathan & Doralyn Elgby and their delightful family is always a joy!"

In September, Crossroads Congregational Church in Northfield, Ontario, welcomed their new missionary family: Jae and Eun Park and their two daughters. This church has




