On September 11, 2022, Deb and I were at Bezanson Community Church in Alberta to join them in celebrating the church's 51st anniversary. I read aloud a letter Mr. Leland Snider wrote in 1970 asking Village Missions to send a missionary pastor to establish

a church there. From 1971-1990, four Village Missionaries served at Bezanson. Seeing this thriving church—and celebrating with them—was such a beautiful reminder of why Village Missions exists: to glorify Jesus Christ by developing spiritually vital churches in rural North America.

Village Missionaries haven't served at Bezanson since 1990, but our partnership with the church didn't end that year. Since then, Bezanson Community Church has faithfully given to VM so that other rural areas have a thriving church and Gospel presence. At our last VM banquet in Grand Prairie, folks from this church filled two tables.

THE WORK OF GOD IN A RURAL CHURCH



In Marysville, B.C., missionary pastor Joe Letourneau encouraged the handful of people at Tuesday prayer time to pray that God would bring 5 new families to Marysville Community Church. They prayed for five new families who would be committed to the church and serving in it. The following week, two new families came. They returned the next Sunday, and two additional new families visited. The next month another family and two single women came through the doors.

Throughout the rest of the year, the church regularly welcomed new visitors. Some were invited by church members, one family came because their son met Pastor Joe's son, and others because they discovered MCC's website and online sermons. Some weeks nearly 50 people were participating in Sunday worship services.

Pastor Joe couldn't help recalling his first year in Marysville, when the average attendance was fewer than 20. Now, six years later, he reflected, "The Lord is doing something, and I find myself along for the ride. Visitors are coming. People are asking about baptism. Many are growing spiritually and wanting more of God's Word."

One Sunday, four of the new couples asked about membership and how they could serve in the church. It was a

big answer to prayer! In addition to organizing a membership class, Pastor Joe started a sermon series inspired by the book "I am a Church Member" by Thom Rainer.

People stepped up to serve in the church by cleaning the building, maintaining the church grounds, or helping to lead worship. The weekly offering reached a level where the church could take on more of the pastor's salary. Ten people became members, and three joined the church board.

Of course, the year wasn't without discouragements and the challenges that come with change. Some people left or drifted away. But Marysville Community Church is showing all the signs of a thriving church. We praise God!

MISSIONARIES TO A NEW FIELD: DELIA, AB



Delia is a village at the base of the Hand Hills in southern Alberta. Most of the residents are retirees, but many families live and farm outside the town. When Delia Christian Fellowship contacted Village Missions in 2022, they had been without a pastor since 2016. In September, they welcomed Village Missionaries Isaac & Esther Lee with their son.

Delia has one other church, but it doesn't have a pastor or regular services. Within a couple days of the Lees' arrival, people were greeting Isaac with the words, "Hi, pastor!" He enjoys dropping by the coffee shop and attending town events. Delia is small—less than 200 people live in the village—but it has an excellent k-12 school with 150 students. Delia Christian Fellowship is small, too, but the church family has persevered, and now they have a full-time pastor! Isaac and

Several Christian Women's Clubs in Saskatchewan are partnering with Village Missions again.

In the 1970s, Karen Totten was invited to a Christian Women's Club (CWC) in Regina by a fellow high school teacher. Through the club, Karen came to know the Lord Jesus. The club is also where she first heard about Village Missions, which CWC supported for many years. Karen continued to be involved in CWC for the next several decades.


After a hiatus of some years, the clubs in Saskatchewan started planning to resume in 2021. In Canada, CWC had a new name—RSVP Ministries—but the same vision: "to invite women into a relationship with Jesus Christ, inspire them to grow, and encourage them to invest generously in the lives of others." The clubs in Saskatchewan wanted a project. Karen contacted VM and met with Murray & Deb Graham.

In January 2023, Village Missionary Jenneke Schnee attended three CWC events in Fort Qu'Appelle and Regina and presented the work of VM. The women responded with excitement and generosity. "I was amazed when two clubs sent Village Missions gifts totaling over 1300 dollars!" Karen said.

In November 2022, Karen joined the VM board of directors. She is passionate about helping rural churches thrive.
