He knew that she had cancer because the church family was praying for her. In his office, Bonnie handed him a sheet of paper with information about herself and said, "I'm dying. I want you to do my funeral service."

Then she said, "There's one other thing. I feel I need to be baptized so that I can go to heaven." Pastor Ed gently explained that baptism is a proclamation that a person knows Jesus. Knowing Jesus is the way to heaven.

When Bonnie left Pastor Ed's office, she was a child of God and had peace that she would go to heaven when she died. Soon afterward, she was baptized in front of a few people.

Bonnie didn't attend Garrington Community Church. Why did she choose to talk with Pastor Ed? Because he is regarded as the community pastor. But that role didn't come quickly or easily.

"I befriended the store manager of the local co-op store. He was willing to tell me about the community. But

when I went into the coffee shop at the back of the store, it would clean out within minutes. It seemed people were afraid of me."

For several years Ed felt like a stranger in this tight-knit

community. But as he visited people in their homes or on their farms, they realized he wouldn't push them into something like a forceful salesperson.

Then people started calling on him to do funerals and weddings.

As Ed participated in community events and sang with a local group called "Fred and Friends," he was accepted as a friend.

Nine months later, he was in hospital and nearing the end. Ed received a call one night around 10 pm. Carl had been asking for him.

At Carl's bedside, Ed took his hand. Carl could no longer speak, but he responded to Ed's questions by squeezing his hand.

When Ed reflects on the past 29 years, he says he has grown with the church. "As a young pastor, I felt that everything in the church hinged on me. I've grown to understand that God calls me to lean on his resources and do the best I can. I've learned to let God work moment by moment and to allow the Holy Spirit to give me the words to say."
